MINUTES

CCC Business

- Officer elections will be held at our next meeting on May 2nd. Nominations were opened for Vice Chair and Marketing Chair.
 - Vice Chair is currently held by Chana Land, and she acts as a director of special projects.
 - Marketing Chair is currently held by Rachel Edwards, who helps with creation of the newsletter and overall marketing for the CCC.

- The bylaws currently state that the director of Student Health Service and director of Healthy Campus appoint the Chair of the CCC. The Chair then appoints the secretary. Discussion was opened on the changing the bylaws. No motions were made to revise the bylaws.

City & Community

- City of Clemson Social Host Ordinance has been proposed.
 - Section 13-14 is now in effect. It can be found on the [City's website](#).
 - The ordinance is in conjunction with the noise ordinance that's already in place.
 - If the host calls 911 to report someone *under the age of 21* in need of medical assistance due to alcohol consumption, they will not be held to the ordinance.
 - This would *not* negate a state-level charge if someone were to pass away or be in a coma. The call would only negate the social host charge.
 - Chief Dixon is planning to do a media blitz to provide further education. Articles have been published on [The Tiger](#), WYFF, FOX and [WPSA](#).
 - Police will be in a "warning period" for a little bit. This will definitely end around the second week of August.
 - It was suggested to table at the Welcome Back festival and at the housing fair on campus in October. The information will also be included in the handouts at orientation. Additionally, offices associated with Clemson could help promote this information.
- Spring Into Clemson – March 31st
 - Open container laws were suspended, went really smooth from the city police perspective.
- SAAM Updates

- Ain't Patty's Day Report
 - There were more arrests this year than in past years, but there were **no EMS calls downtown**. By about 8'oclock the SLED agents were leaving. Leasa Evinger and Captain Brad Rhodes noted that on-campus was not impacted and that there were no arrests on campus.

Clemson University

- Step Up Bystander Intervention Training will be brought to the Greek community at Clemson. A "train the trainer" 90-minute webinar will be offered by the end of the semester. All 45 chapters will then be trained in the fall. Step Up covers a variety of topics including alcohol and other drugs, sexual assault, hazing, other topics.
 - Harriet-Graham sent out a request to staff and other individuals who would like to become trainers. Trained staff will be able to use it to train other student groups. A community member session was also suggested.
 - Training will be held on Tuesday, May 1st from 12 pm – 2 pm, the location is TBD.

- Data Collection Efforts
 - National College Health Assessment has been completed and had record participation of 1,379, which was about a 28% response rate.
 - The College Prescription Drug Study launched Wednesday, April 4 and will be sent to 5,000 students. Over 620 students have taken this survey so far. This survey will be open until the end of April.
