

## Economics (BA) Curriculum Worksheet (2022-2023)

This worksheet outlines the required courses for this major. Students are expected to be familiar with general education and majorspecific requirements for their intended major as outlined in the Clemson Undergraduate Catalog. Additionally, students must satisfy any Tri-County prerequisites for the courses below. To complete Bridge program requirements, students must earn 30 credits at Tri-County and a 2.5 GPA during their Bridge year (fall, spring, and optional summer, if needed). Students should consult the backside of this worksheet, the Undergraduate Catalog, and the Bridge Academic Guide for Clemson course equivalencies and alternative courses if students wish to enroll in other courses or if any of the following requirements have been met through dual enrollment or AP/IB credit. Advising worksheets are supplemental planning aids and are for informational purposes only.

Economics B.A. assists students in cultivating a greater understanding of human behavior, business, and public policy, and it prepares students for a wide range of careers. By combining general education courses and a strong course of study in Economics, students can prepare for graduate studies in business, law, or any of the social sciences and careers in business and government. This degree requires students to complete a modern language requirement through the sophomore level. Compared to the Economics B.S., it requires fewer business courses from other disciplines. The B.A. degree offers students maximum freedom to tailor their course of study to their specific interests and career goals.
