What

The purpose of the 4-H Presentations program is to provide youth with the activities and tools that teach them how to research, plan, organize, create, and deliver a presentation.

Through a positive learning environment, 4-H youth will be able to develop effective public speaking skills and will be able to practice and perform these skills with confidence.

Why

Being able to speak well in public is a skill that can help you throughout your life. People like Abraham Lincoln, John F. Kennedy, and Martin Luther King, Jr. were known for their speaking ability. They were able to accomplish great things because they had an important message and they had the skills to deliver that message.

Presentations teach, entertain, inform or persuade. Demonstrations and illustrated talks are two types of presentations.

A **demonstration** is a way to teach others, step by step, how to do or make something.

An **illustrated talk** is a useful way to explain a topic using models, posters, or charts.

4-H members have lots of great messages too, and this program helps them gain the skills to deliver their messages.

Communication skills are vital in today's workforce. Practicing these skills helps 4-H members prepare to make the best bet-
ter.

Remember - Things to Keep in Mind

All presentation must be prepared for and given by youth. No adult or audience participation is allowed.

Select a topic that truly interests you so you will enjoy both learning about that topic and sharing it with others.

Practice, practice, practice. The more you practice (in front of a mirror, video tape yourself, in front of family, friends, or your club) the better presenter you will become!



A new presentation should be created each year.



General Information

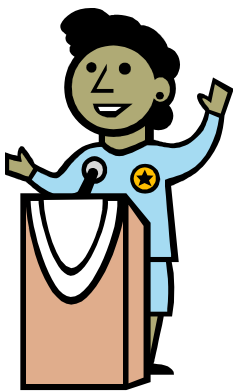
► Cloverbud presentations should be between 1 and 5 minutes.

► Junior presentations are expected to be between 3 and 8 minutes.

► Senior presentations are expected to be between 8 and 12 minutes.

► Presentations may be given by an individual or a two person team.

► Public speaking is considered an advanced skill. Speeches may only be given by individuals (no teams). Competitive speaking classes are only open to senior members.

Regional Trainings

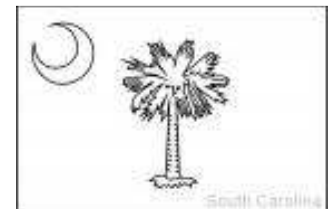
Four trainings will be held in January to teach youth presentation skills and to familiarize them with the general expectations for presentation contests.

These trainings will include some hands on activities and will be led by local 4-H Ambassadors. Role modeling and practice will be part of each training.

There will be one training in each of the following Extension regions: Up-

state, Midlands, Pee Dee, and Savannah Valley. Contact your local county 4-H agent for specific details and complete registration information.

It is strongly encouraged to have at least one member from each club attend a training; then they can conduct a workshop for the other members of their club. Teaching others is a perfect example of practicing presentations skills.



Regional Contests

There will be four presentation contests held in March. These contests will serve as the selection process for participation in the state presentation contest.

There will be one contest in each of the following Extension regions: Upstate, Midlands, Pee Dee, and Savannah Valley. Contact your local county 4-H agent for specific details and complete registration

information.

It is strongly encouraged to have every club participate in the regional contest. It is the perfect opportunity to meet youth from other clubs, learn about other project areas, and to practice and receive constructive criticism on one's all important speaking skills.
