COURSE OVERVIEW

Course Description: Introductory course designed to provide an overview to intercultural communication questions stemming from the growing diversity and interconnectedness of the United States and the world. In order to develop a foundational level of cross-cultural competency, this course will challenge students to learn about the ways people from different cultural backgrounds think, communicate, and behave based on the value systems, worldviews, and narratives that ground them.

Course Objectives: As a foundational course in communication, this course is intended to prepare students for critical and effective service in the global context. Studies will emphasize both theory and practice to facilitate holistic academic and personal growth in the knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary for successful communication and engagement across cultures. This course may also motivate students to enroll in more language and culture-related courses and participate in study abroad programs to enhance cultural experience and skills.

- Demonstrate the ability to analyze and interpret multicultural and immigrant experience

COURSE PEDAGOGY AND PROCEDURES

Given the nature of the subject, this course emphasizes theory in practice with priorities on personal, critical reflection (awareness), academic engagement (knowledge), and experiential learning (skills).



To foster personal and critical reflection, much of our class time will be spent in discussion. It is important that you bring your ideas and questions to class with you and share them with others in the class. I will strive for an atmosphere where every student participates and receives the constructive and respectful response of other students. Certain assignments and class activities will also be given with a focus on building a deeper self-awareness of your own cultural values, behaviors, and worldview. I place a high value on your ability to critically evaluate your own identity in relation to what we are learning and encourage you to keep a personal journal in relation to the challenges the material presents.

In order to deepen academic knowledge and engagement, readings from a variety of primary and secondary sources will be assigned to give students a comprehensive survey of the cross-cultural field. This knowledge will be evaluated through traditional examinations focused on identifying definitions and theoretical models as well as research projects that connect theory to current events and case studies through careful analysis. Students are expected to read assigned material ahead of class meetings and come with thoughts and questions prepared for discussion. As a facilitator, I can usually tell the difference between someone who has read the material and does not understand it versus the one who did not read it at all. Students must understand that class time is meant for engaging material, not reviewing it.





In order to begin building the necessary skills for competent cross-cultural engagement, you will complete a number of experiential learning activities. Understanding theory requires far more than reading and writing, but also doing through observation, speaking, and action. This is especially true when seeking to study and understand the influential reach of culture on communication and conflict. One cannot simply know cross-cultural dynamics, one must experience them.

Explanation: A few courses currently on the 2014 curriculum map have been moved to different semesters (they are marked in bold in the accompanying 2015 curriculum map). Specifically, these changes are:

- 1. In the Junior year we want to move Audio 2790 to the fall and Audio 4800 to the spring. This will allow students to take Audio 3800 in the fall and move to Audio 4800 in the spring, which will be helpful for some of the change of major students. It will also encourage more students to register for the Audio practicum in the fall. While the audio practicum is offered both semesters, we have more needs in the fall since we provide sound support for the band at football games.
- 2. In the senior year, we wish to move Audio 4850, the senior audio project, to the fall. Students are finding it difficult to complete this project within the scope of one semester. By moving this to the fall, it will be possible to take an incomplete and still graduate in May. To balance this change we will move three hours of minor requirements to the spring semester of the senior year.
