Learning Objectives

By revealing the interrelations among law, culture, and society, this course introduces students to anthropological approaches to the study of law. Students will learn the historical landmarks in the development of legal anthropology. They will also learn issues such as the power of language in legal processes, social hierarchy, the identity of legal subjects, intellectual property, the transformation of property relations and value in postsocialist countries, human rights, multiculturalism and international disputes, and legal pluralism. This course will help students think critically about how we should understand the place of the law in human society and to what extent the law determines what happens in a society.


