Catalog Description: Study of the ways in which international law interacts with international politics. International law is inherently political because it interacts closely with both international and domestic politics. The course examines the use, design, and consequences of international law for a wide range of actors in world politics.

Required course for students in: It will be a core option in international relations for BA political science majors, political science minors, and global studies minors. It will also be a core option in global politics for BS political science majors.

Statement of need and justification based on assessment results of student learning outcomes: International law is a core area within the study of international relations, which is itself one of the major sub-disciplines within political science. Our assessments of student learning outcomes based on the ETS Major Field Test in Political Science indicate that senior political science majors score below the national median in knowledge of international relations. This course will go a long way toward filling that void. Moreover, our senior exit survey assessment tool indicates that many of our political science majors are interested in legal careers. These students need to have more exposure to courses dealing with law during their undergraduate careers.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: What is international law? How has it come about? Who and what does it govern? How effective is it? What obstacles does it face? How can it be improved? This course employs both a positive and normative approach to surveying issues and developments in international law. While not all-inclusive, it introduces students to the main concepts, institutions, and methodology that serve as the foundation of current international legal practice. Through detailed analysis of international conventions, customs, cases, and current events, students will acquire an understanding of the sources of international law, the relationship between international and domestic law, principles of jurisdiction, international dispute resolution, state sovereignty and responsibility, human rights law, international criminal law, international organizations, the legal use of force, and international environmental law.

OBJECTIVES: Through active engagement in class, students will:

- Comprehend the basic principles, practices, and instruments of international law
- Develop practical, transferrable skills such as reading comprehension, critical thinking, analytical research, and persuasive writing
- Cooperate and communicate with one another to share knowledge and expertise
- Recognize where the course material fits into scholarly dialogue and analyze strengths/weaknesses within an argument
- Identify applicability of course material to personal interests and real-world events

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES: Personal responsibility is imperative. All assigned readings (including the introduction to each section and notes at the end of each case) and case briefings should be done <u>before</u> class to facilitate lecture and discussion. Though heavy, it's a good idea to bring your textbook to class. Please check Blackboard and your CU email regularly for important updates and announcements, as you will be accountable for all information transmitted via these electronic resources.

REQUIREMENTS: The course is structured as follows:

Quizzes (15%) & Exams (40%)

There will be four short multiple choice quizzes (each worth 5% of your final grade), of which the lowest score will be dropped. The midterm and final exam (worth 20% each) will consist of a combination of multiple choice, short answer, matching, and essay questions. There are NO make-ups!

Attendance (10%) & Participation (10%)

Class format will vary between discussion, group activities, multimedia presentations, case studies, and lecture. Attendance, preparation, and participation are critical as the course builds cumulatively upon all earlier material. Students are given two "freebie" absences throughout the course of the semester...use them wisely! Each additional absence will result in a 10% deduction off your final attendance grade. In sum, your grade is based on showing up, speaking up, clicking in, and turning in miscellaneous daily assignments.

Research Paper (20%)

Students are required to write a 5-7 page research paper on a topic of their choice related to an international legal issue that was not directly covered in class. (See suggested topics on Blackboard; first come, first serve so sign up early!) All standard rules apply: 12-point font, double-spaced, 1-inch margins, proper citation, bibliography, etc. Students are strongly encouraged to meet with me ahead of time to discuss their paper ideas. A 1-2 page detailed proposal in outline form (worth 5%) is due in class on Tuesday, October 9th. Final drafts (worth 15%) are due at the beginning of class on Thursday, November 15th. Only hard copies will be accepted, though an electronic version must also be uploaded to http://www.turnitin.com (Class ID: 5342612; Password: POSC????) no later than 5pm that same day. A 10% per business day late penalty will be strictly enforced for both paper components and no grade will be given until both versions have been received.

Class Debate (5%)

Students will be randomly assigned to one of two sides for a structured class debate over whether international law is "effective" or not on Tuesday, December 4th. One class period will be set aside prior the debate so that groups can discuss their positions and prepare formal arguments. On the day of the debate, students must also submit a 1 page typed, double-spaced reflection of their personal position on the issue and why.

Course Description:

This course introduces undergraduate students to quantitative methods in political science. As opposed to other political science courses, in which students study a substantive topic in the field, this course focuses on helping students understand where this substantive knowledge originates. This course also seeks to provide students with the tools to become producers of knowledge, rather than simple consumers.

The goal of this course is to introduce students to the process of producing quantitative research, including the scientific method, developing a literature review, collecting data, and analyzing those data through use of appropriate statistical techniques. By the end of the semester, students will also become more critical consumers of research, identifying how the study was conducted and what the strengths and weaknesses of that study are.

This course has two components which students often find intimidating: mastery of mathematical formulas and understanding the results of statistical models. I will do my best to make learning these as painless as possible, and I assume no prior knowledge of either of these components.

- 1. Political Science Research Methods, Seventh Edition. By Janet B. Johnson, and H. T. Reynolds. ("J&R" hereafter)
- 2. Assorted handouts (distributed in class) and articles (found on Blackboard)

However, given that approximately half of the questions for the exams will come directly from lecture, *students should not expect to do well without regularly attending lecture*. Additionally, the participation component of the course grade makes regular attendance important. You obviously cannot participate without attending class.

Participation:

Students are encouraged to participate in the class meetings. <u>Note: Participation does not simply mean opening your mouth in class, but rather consists of contributing positively to the class discussion</u>. Participation will be scored on randomly selected days throughout the semester. You will be evaluated based on your level of participation relative to the class average.

Excused Absences:

Any student missing an **exam or a due date for a paper or problem set** must <u>provide documentation</u> to schedule a make-up or turn in a late paper/assignment. *No late assignments will be accepted without proper documentation*. The student must contact me within 1 week of the exam or paper/problem set due date to schedule a make-up option and present documentation.

Academic Integrity, Cheating and Plagiarism:
