

APRIL 10, 2025: TIMELY UPDATE FROM INTERNATIONAL SERVICES

International Services understands this is an uncertain time for international students, scholars, and faculty across the United States. You are a valuable member of the Clemson community, and we are here to support you. Immigration Documents

International Services **strongly advises** all students to identify your most recent immigration documents and take steps to safeguard these documents in the following manner:

- Upload the most recent copy of your passport, I-94, and F/J visa stamp to International Services iStart Portal under the Biographical Information tab.
- Keep a digital copy of these documents, including your I-20/DS-2019, on your computer and cell phone.
- Keep the following original documents in your possession at all times to document your lawful status:
 - Your valid and unexpired passport.
 - o Remember, your passport should be valid for at least six months into the future.
 - o If needed, you can renew your passport while in the U.S.
 - A printed and signed copy of your most recent I-20 (F-1) or DS-2019 (J-1).
 - A printed and signed copy of your most recent <u>I-94 arrival record</u>.
 - The I-94 must state "Class of Admission" as F-1 or J-1 and "Admit Until Date" as D/S (duration of status.)

International Travel

While comprehensive travel restrictions have not been announced as of the date of this communication, we continue to monitor potential changes in current immigration rules and recommend that students from <u>potentially impacted countries</u> avoid non-essential international travel until further clarity is present.

Additionally, all students planning to travel with an expired F-1/J-1 visa, should be prepared for expanded visa application screenings, which may result in increased delays and potential denials. It is essential that you weigh the risk of international travel and how it could impact your studies if you were to be delayed or prevented from returning to the U.S.

If you do plan to travel outside the U.S., International Services strongly advises reviewing the guidance below before your departure.

- 1. Address Updates You must update your local U.S. and foreign address within 10 days of moving.
 - Federal regulations require students update their local and foreign address within 10 days of an address change. An incorrect local or foreign address in SEVIS could be grounds for termination.
 - This information must be updated via the <u>iStart Portal</u>, Biographical Information, and Biographical Contact Information Update. Completing this form will allow International Services to update your local and foreign address information with SEVIS.
- 2. You must notify International Services of your international travel and request a travel signature by submitting the Travel Information e-form in the <u>iStart Portal</u>.
 - o Travel signatures for enrolled F-1 and J-1 students are valid for 12 months.
 - o Travel signatures for those on OPT are valid for 6 months.
 - International Services issues electronic I-20s and DS-2019s with digital signatures; however, you must print and sign the I-20 and DS-2019 to request re-entry to the U.S.
- 3. Review the <u>Travel and Visas</u> section of our website to confirm what documents you need for international travel.
 - F-1/J-1 visas cannot be renewed within the U.S. and must be applied for outside the U.S.
 - o If you depart the U.S. with an expired visa, you must renew the visa to request reentry to the U.S.
 - Some U.S. Embassies struggle with appointment availability, and it may be difficult to schedule a visa appointment.
 - The U.S. Department of State publishes information on <u>visa appointment wait times</u>, on their website.
 - Review specific <u>U.S. Embassy websites</u> for local procedures and instructions to prepare to apply for a visa renewal.
- 4. Due to the possibility of delays with renewing visas, we recommend that you:
 - Contact your academic adviser to discuss the impact of a potential travel delay on your academic progress and, if applicable, your assistantship.
 - If you work on campus, contact <u>International Employment</u> in the Office of Human Resources for information on how a potential travel delay could impact your employment eligibility.

Remember to look for updates on the International Services <u>website</u>, the U.S. Department of State <u>website</u>, and if applicable to the appropriate resources of the country issuing your passport.
