Interview of the Chairman of the Advisory Board for the Rutland for Ethics, Kelly Durham

BIOGRAPHY:

Durham recently retired from First Sun Management Corp. where he served as president and co-owner of the 47-store Wendy's franchise. During his tenure, the company was recognized by Wendy's Corp. for the best operation, best marketing and best sales in the United States. In 2012, Durham was one of six winners of the Distinguished Service Award, the Clemson Alumni Association's highest honor. He has chaired Clemson University's Board of Visitors and currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Clemson University Foundation as well as the Clemson Corps. He wrote, directed and produced a documentary about the Scroll of Honor Memorial, which honors Clemson alumni who have died in service to their country. He was also a member of the Westlone initiative committee. Durham graduated from Clemson University in 1980, having received the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award, which recognizes "recipient's influence for good, excellence in maintaining high ideals of living and genuine service to others."

He served in the U.S. Army from 1981 to 1985, stationed in Germany, attaining the rank of captain. Durham and his wife, Yvonne, are residents of Clemson and active members of First Baptist Church. The Durham's have three daughters, Mary Kate (a Clemson student), Addison and Callie.

INTERVIEW:

It was an honor to interview Mr. Durham, Chairman of the Advisory Board for the Rutland Institute for Ethics, about his experience with the Institute and how it has played a part in his own life. When asked what led him to become a board member for the Rutland Institute for Ethics, Durham credited both his background in political science as well as the fact he has been a long-time family friend with the founder of the Institute, Bob Rutland. He can remember his relationship with Rutland from a very young age, around 5 or 6 years old, when Rutland was a student at Clemson. When Rutland asked him to serve on the board, the answer was an absolute yes. He was asked to become the chairman of the board, and he accepted because he wanted to serve both the Institute and Clemson University as a whole. He feels privileged to serve in his position with a talented board that is dedicated to expanding the Institute on campus and beyond.



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The position of Chairman of the Board has led him to work closely with Dr. William McCoy, director of the Rutland Institute for Ethics. Together, they work to bring resources to Clemson, open doors and network to connect the Institute with organizations all around that could benefit from the offerings the Institute provides. Durham has witnessed the need for ethics in every aspect of life. He explained we are always in connection with others, and we want to trust them. We are able to do that more readily when we believe they have an ethical foundation. He explained the need for ethics applies in places such as church, business, schools, government and every other endeavor in which we are serving others. BIOGRAPHY:

Dr. Brookes Brown is an assistant professor in Philosophy and the Director of the Law, Liberty and Justice Program at Clemson University. She works in ethics and applied ethics, public law, democratic theory, business ethics, moral epistemology, and administrative legal theory.

She received her Ph.D. in political philosophy from Princeton University in January 2016, has a J.D. from Yale University and a B.A. from Brown University. She spent 2014-2015 as a DeOlazarra fellow in political philosophy, law and policy at the University of Virginia.

At the moment, Dr. Brown focuses on civic ethics in the context of market economies, considering the ways in which complex institutional analysis changes our thinking about political ethics, and on methodology in political philosophy. She also drinks altogether too much coffee.

What motivated you to get involved with Dr. Dilemma?

I have worked in ethics for years and enjoy seeing how it plays out in every aspect of other people's lives.

How do you hope Dr. Dilemma impacts student-life at Clemson?

I hope Dr. Dilemma gets students thinking about the moral concerns they face in life. We make ethical choices on a daily basis, even when we don't realize it, so I hope this brings awareness to that.

What made you decide to not have the "character" of Dr. Dilemma be anonymous anymore?

I am not sure if Dr. Dilemma was ever totally anonymous or what led it to not being anonymous. I am happy to stand by the claims I make though and am willing to let people ask me about anything I say directly. You're supposed to try to be controversial, if you can!

For students not familiar with Dr. Dilemma, what kind of issues can they inquire about?

Students can ask virtually anything! It definitely does not need to only be focused on academics. As long as you are being respectful of someone else's confidentiality who may not want to be named, anything is fair game.

How could everyone be a "Dr. Dilemma" to the people in their lives?

A lot of people already are! The role is essentially to listen and talk to people while helping them consciously think through the ethical aspects of their actions and decisions.
