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2021-2022 In Review

20TH ANNIVERSARY CAMPAIGN

To celebrate our 20th anniversary, we launched our 20th Anniversary Campaign in the spring of 2021. We set a goal of raising \$100,000 for the TIDE Conference and exceeded that goal by June of 2022.

ANNUAL ETHICS DAY

This year's Annual Ethics Day was cosponsored by the College of Education and the speaker, Dr. Kevin Kumashiro, was selected by their faculty. Dr. Kumashiro presented virtually with an option to view and participate in the presentation in-person. Over 130 students, faculty, and community members attended the event.

BUS 1010

We continue to work with the Wilbur O. and Ann Powers College of Business to bring in ethics speakers for their BUS 1010 courses in the Fall, Spring, and Summer semesters. This year, over 1500 students attended the presentations. Classes were spread out over 49 sessions throughout the year with 14 different alumni and business speakers presenting.

STUDENT AWARDS

The institute received a record number of applications for their two student awards this year. Because of the number of high quality applications, two additional Cherry Braswell Rutland Memorial Awards were given out, for a total of three, and three additional J.T. Barton, Jr. Memorial Ethics Awards were given out, for a total of six.

TIDE CONFERENCE

A record number of attendees joined us for this year's TIDE Conference. Over 600 people attended 8 sessions presented over 4 days this spring. Every college session increased the number of attendees over last year's conference.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Social media continues to be one of our most important ways of communicating with students and marketing our events. After beginning our Instagram page in the spring of 2021, we continued to grow followers on that platform 124% over the year. Facebook and Twitter followers also increased, 11% and 4% respectively.

Ethical dilemmas, ethical decisions, ethical behavior. Where do we learn how to handle ethical dilemmas or learn the process for making ethical decisions or meet the role models to teach us ethical behavior? I don't have the answer. However, I do know that the Rutland Institute is working hard to meet our goal of providing the tools and support necessary for each college to expand ethics education and ethical leadership at Clemson University.

This year, I participated in two events provided by the Rutland Institute to promote ethics and ethical leadership. These were both "hands-on" events interacting with students and professors.

Each year, the Business 1010 class has guest speakers to talk about an ethical dilemma and how to use the STAR Model to arrive at an ethical resolution. It's truly difficult to stand before a class and talk about an ethical decision you made

and how your decision might have been different if you had learned a structured method, like the STAR Model, for making your decisions. Gut reaction is not an ethical decision process! While I'm sure the students make many ethical decisions daily, to expose them to ethical decisions they might have in their professional career is valuable to their Business education.

This year I also participated as a judge with the High School Ethics Case Competition and asked my sister to join me. We were raised by the same parents and were exposed to ethics from a very young age. So we think alike, right? Wrong. It was interesting to see how each team presented a solution to the ethical dilemma and how differently my sister and I thought about those solutions. (Yes, we are still friends too.) Ethical decisions aren't always easy.

Participation in programs offered by the Rutland Institute reinforces the need to continue to grow in our ethical education and ethical behavior. We enhance our ability to step aside from societal influence and make our own ethical decisions. CREATING HABITS AND NORMS GUIDING ETHICAL DECISIONS (CHANGE) STUDENT GROUP

Clemson's student ethics committee and the student voice of the Rutland Institute for Ethics, CHANGE is a prestigious student organization consisting of both undergraduate and graduate students from a variety of backgrounds and majors.

CHANGE continues to hold representation from all seven colleges at Clemson University. During the 2021-2022 school year, CHANGE gained five new members across three colleges. In January of 2022, CHANGE rewrote its constitution to reflect a change in leadership roles. The Graduate Assistant for the Rutland Institute now serves as the student advisor for CHANGE. The President role is now filled by an undergraduate member of CHANGE. Leadership roles include Graduate Assistant, President, Vice President, Assistant Vice President of Historical Context, Chief Financial Officer, Chief Administrative Officer, Chief Marketing Officer, and Chief Alumni Relations Officer.

Throughout the school year, CHANGE focused on expanding its presence on Clemson's campus and began to host events in person again. This year, CHANGE was able to hold meetings in person, host tabling events twice a month, and host in-person events for the first time since 2020. CHANGE also wrote the ethical dilemma for the 2022 High School Ethics Case Competition, volunteered during the High School Ethics Case Competition, wrote the first and second issues of the fourth volume of the Ethics Editorial Newsletter, and conducted programming that focused on ethics and ethical decision-making. CHANGE held six events this year for the Clemson student population.

Desserts and Dilemmas- University-Wide Event to discuss ethical dilemmas that Clemson students have faced while also introducing them to the STAR model.

In 2018, through the Robert J. Rutland Institute for Ethics at Clemson University, an award opportunity was established to provide financial assistance for students who exhibit ethical leadership through excellent decision-making skills. Named after Mrs. Cherry Braswell Rutland, the late wife of Mr. Rutland, the award is designed to recognize a student at Clemson University who has demonstrated ethical fortitude in the face of a true ethical dilemma.

This year the Cherry Braswell Rutland Memorial Award was given to Raleigh Adams. Raleigh is a Clemson second year student majoring in Political Science and Philosophy with an emphasis in Law, Liberty, and Justice. Raleigh grew up in Easley, South Carolina where the importance of ethical leadership was emphasized and shown in practice to her from a young age by her parents and grandparents in their service as small business owners and leaders to the upstate community. After Clemson, Raleigh is impassioned to provide law services to those members of the community that need it the most, to act as an ethical third party and be of service to make the lives of those around her better.

Additionally, we saw so many amazing applications this year that the committee decided to award two smaller prizes. Haley Blazer and Bryanna Thobe received these two honorable mention awards. Haley is a senior in the Language and International Health BS program and Haley is a junior majoring in Packaging Science with a minor in Business Administration.

J.T. BARTON, JR. MEMORIAL ETHICS AWARD

In 2001, Stephan Barton established an ethics award in honor of his late father, J.T. Barton Jr. Mr. Barton was a proud alumnus of Clemson University (Class of 1950), and passed the spirit of excellence down to his son – Stephan – who is also a proud Clemson University graduate (1972). Three awards are given to a singular student and/or student groups on the Clemson University campus who programmatically use the award to advance good ethical decision-making skills and ethical leadership.

This year's first place award was given to Eta Sigma Gamma, a national health education honorary society. ESG hosted a session on medical ethics and ended with an intense game of Ethical Jeopardy. Second place was awarded to the Biosystems Engineering Club for their panel on fast fashions and ethics. Third place went to CU-REACH to help with costs for career workshops in STEM and minorities. This year we also gave out three additional honorable mention awards to The Aurantico, CHANGE, and an individual award to Erica Wearing. Congratulations to all of this year's award recipients!

The TIDE Conference, held in March 2022, was a smashing success!

Utilizing feedback from the previous year, we allotted individual days and times for each presentation, thereby allowing everyone on campus the opportunity to engage with as many presentations as desired. ETHICAL STUDENT LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE



After going virtual last year, it was great to have the 3rd Annual Ethical Student Leadership Conference back on campus. Clemson once again hosted and 22 students attended from Clemson University, The Citadel, and Coastal Carolina University. The two-day conference began the afternoon of Friday, February 18th through Saturday, February 19th.

Sessions included Building Leadership, Leading with Ethics, and Ethical Leadership in Practice. Students also got to enjoy some downtime during dinner and bowling night at Clemson's Underground Recreation Center. The Ethical Leadership in Practice panel was helmed by former Advisory Board Chair Kelly Durham and Board member Sam Erwin.

We are looking forward to moving the conference off campus and giving Clemson students a chance to travel to The Citadel for the 2023 conference.

HIGH SCHOOL ETHICS CASE COMPETITION



On March 4, 2022, the Rutland Institute for Ethics hosted Clemson's 2022 High School Ethics Case Competition. This year, the Rutland Institute held two competitions simultaneously. One competition was held in person on Clemson's main campus, and the second competition was held virtually via Zoom. This competition included teams of two high school students presenting their response to an ethical dilemma in front of a panel of judges. The case for the 2022 Competition, based on a fictional dilemma, was written by CHANGE.

This year's teams came not just from high schools in Anderson, Oconee, Pickens, Greenville, and Spartanburg counties but also high schools in Florida, New York, Indiana, Arizona, and Virginia. Recruitment included efforts to reconnect with schools that previously participated in the competition while also focusing on our connections in the counties surrounding Clemson. A total of 10 high schools participated in the competition, including Augusta Christian Schools, Westside High School, Seneca High School, Maclay School, Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology, Albany Academy, Brown School, Culver Academies, Shaker High School, Bethlehem Central High School, and Brophy College Preparatory. Representing those ten schools were a total of 13 teams (26 students). Judging the competition were a total of 13 judges, including Advisory Board members and Clemson faculty. The goal for next year's competition is to continue to host the competition in a hybrid format and to expand our connections with schools across the Upstate and the country.

We would like to thank every student-competitor, advisor, volunteer, and judge for participating in the competition.

We would also like to give a special thank you to Rutland Advisory Board Member Anderson Garcia for providing a personable and motivational keynote address.

FACULTY STAR MODEL TRAINING WORKSHOPS

Beginning academic year 2022/23, the Rutland Institute for Ethics will offer a bi-annual in-person faculty training designed to assist in STAR Decision-Making Model curriculum integration. In addition, we will have a "how-to" training video available for faculty members unable to physically attend which will feature several FACE members utilizing the model in their classrooms.

These training workshops were piloted in the spring of 2022 with several faculty coming to a lunch time session. The feedback we received will be instrumental as we move forward with planning the 2022-2023 workshops.

GRADUATE DISTINGUISHED ETHICS SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The 2022/23 academic year will also begin the opportunity for graduate students to partake in their own version of the Distinguished Ethics Scholars Program. This program, designed by and for graduate students, allows for attainment of graduation chords or medallions for those interested in engaging in extra-curricular ethics programming. This program will also mark an opportunity for both undergraduate and graduate students to fulfill classroom requirements in a day-long session on campus.

HIGH SCHOOL SUMMER PROGRAM

The Institute has been approached by Rotarians to create a week-long summer session on leadership and ethics for high achieving high school students. We will be working with Clemson's Summer Scholars program to create a course that will be hosted on campus in the summer of 2023. The initial cohort of high school students will come from Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA) programs around the country. New Advisory Board Member Dave Diamond met with the Institute about a possible camp in the summer of 2021.



2021-2022 BUDGET
